
Overwintering Spiranthes "Irish Lady's Tresses"

A species so rare in Summer, hardly ever seen in Winter. How does it survive in Lough Allen? Here are some insights...

Study of 4 specimens of Spiranthes romanzoffiana in south Lough Allen, Leitrim, Ireland, during the year from August 2013 - August 2014.

Technical: This page is created as an A3 pdf to facilitate downloading and printing. It also allows precise positioning and all images are fully scalable up to 4X. ie. these are good sized images pretending to be thumbnails! Just hit the Plus button on your browser or Adobe Acrobat and push the picture around to see more detail on individual photographs. This is done as it is so rare to find pictures of this plant surviving and growing through the Winter and it allows us to show many specimens over many months. There is also much debate as to when and how these plants emerge from the ground as they are often only first detected as they come into bloom. (Our specimens never disappeared even when flooded!) NOTE: All images are the same size but the specimens are not. We have done this to allow detailed viewing of the structures. If we were to show the plants on the left at real scale they would be almost invisible. An indication of the plant height is provided after the date.
